An interactive day looking at how the rider can affect the side saddle and how the side saddle affects the horse and the rider depending on its fitting.

The riders were asked to ride free style around the arena and to perform an individual show. The delegates were asked to judge the saddles only and how comfortable and harmonious they appeared to be for the rider and the horse. This was interesting and there was a clear winner!

Everyone then had a look at the saddles with the riders on board and then dismounted. Discussions took place following everyone being able to have a good look up close and personal!



With lunch served we all reconvened for the afternoon jumping sessions.

Each rider jumped a round and the delegates were encouraged to use the mark sheets provided as the round was conducted. Afterwards feedback from the audience was given to the riders before they jumped their second round. Much discussion took place on the way to improve the rider's rounds. Suffice to say that all of the jockeys did a superb job! It was interesting to note that many people were particularly keen about this session as there are so few opportunities to watch side saddle jumping.
